## DELRAY BEACH CITIZENS CAN MAKE A MIRACLE FOR CHILDREN WITH MENTAL OR PHYSICAL DISABILITIES

"Every child deserves to play baseball." is the slogan for the Miracle League being established in Delray Beach. The Miracle League's mission is to provide opportunities for all children to play baseball regardless of their ability. At a ceremony on July 15<sup>th</sup> at Miller Park, a baseball field complex at the end of SW 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue, City and County officials dedicated a portion of the park to a Miracle League style baseball field. Jeff and Julia Kadel, local residents, are leading the charitable campaign to raise funds to build the specialized field. It will be complete with a cushioned synthetic turf to help prevent injuries, wheelchair accessible dugouts and a completely flat surface to eliminate any barriers to the wheelchair bound or visually impaired players.

The cost to construct the field will be between \$500,000 and \$750,000 and the maintenance over two years will be approximately \$80,000. Fund raising activities have already begun. The City of Delray Beach has contributed \$10,000 and County Commissioner Mary McCarty brought a check for \$10,000 from Palm Beach County. Local business has also shown its support. Kilwin's, at 402 East Atlantic in Delray Beach, has a "Tasty Tuesday at Kilwin's" special wherein Kilwin's will donate 20% of all Tuesday sales to the Miracle League through November 30, 2005. Kilwin's opened in Delray Beach in December of 2001 and is owned by Bill and Alison Whitworth. They specialize in Mackinac Island style fudge, caramel apples and 32 flavors of homemade ice cream.

The hope is that a substantial portion of the funds required may be raised by October, 2006, followed by a six month period of construction. With everyone pitching in, as donors or volunteers, our very special children could be playing ball by early Spring, 2007.

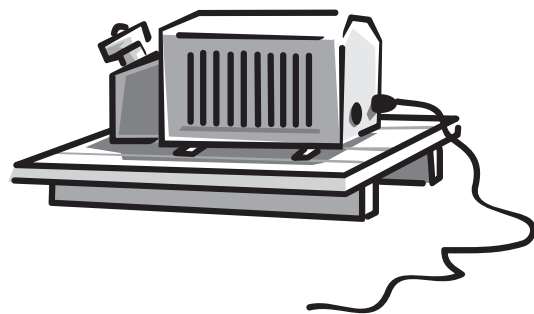

## SAFETY TIPS FOR USING PORTABLE GENERATORS

Delray Beach Fire-Rescue offers the following tips and procedures for the safe use of portable generators during a power outage. If used improperly, portable generators can be very dangerous.

- Read all the manufacturer's instructions before using the equipment.
- Place the generator outside, away from your home or dwelling no less than 10 feet distant.
- Don't place generators under eaves, near windows, doors or in the garage. Make sure exhaust fumes are directed away from any building. Carbon monoxide is odorless, tasteless, invisible and can be fatal.
- Many fires are caused during the refilling of the fuel tank. A small spill on the hot exhaust could cause a fire. Do not fill the fuel tank until the unit has cooled.
- Start the generator after re-fueling without a demand load. That is, don't connect the electrical conduits until the generator has been running for a minute or two.
- Have a licensed electrician install a transfer switch if you don't want to run extension cords from the generator through your dwelling. Make sure the generator is grounded and that you are using the appropriate cords to carry the intended electrical load.

Condominium residents must be especially careful to make sure the use of a portable generator is well away from the building and on the ground. Verandas, patios and balconies are not the place for generator use. Carbon monoxide fumes can easily re-enter the building or build up to dangerous levels.

## POPULAR DELRAY BEACH RESIDENT'S ACADEMY STARTS FALL SESSION ON SEPTEMBER 29, 2005

Beginning on September 29th, the very popular and widely recognized Delray Beach Resident's Academy will conduct sessions over a six week schedule to familiarize locals with their City government, its functions and responsibilities. This is the fourth year that the Resident's Academy has invited the citizens of Delray Beach to a program intended to educate and enlighten dozens of interested residents by introducing them to members of the City Commission, City Manager and various Department Heads that perform the many services the City requires.

Sessions are held every Thursday evening from 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm and by the end of the semester, graduates will have increased their understanding of the organizational structure and operations of all City departments that impact on our quality of life. Graduates of the Academy will be prepared to take a role in City government and many of those who complete the Resident's Academy go on to become members of one of twenty volunteer Advisory Boards that are so important in the decision making process of the City Commission.

Eligibility for the program requires the applicant be a resident of the City of Delray Beach and 18 years of age. Classes are usually limited to 25 participants and class rosters are filled on a first come first serve basis. There is no charge for the program and the Academy asks only for a commitment to the complete the scheduled sessions. A "Citizen's Tool Kit" is provided each attendee and is filled with information about the City and how to contact various departments and navigate the complex system of government with ease.
